

Exceptional Needs Network



Exceptional Needs Network (ENN) is a volunteer organization founded in 2001 which started as a group of parents of special needs kids, reaching out to help others deal with the tremendous demands the group already understood well.

ENN provides three camps a year for children with special needs. These camps accommodate up to 45 developmentally delayed youth, age 6 - 22. The ratio of children to counselors is 1:1. For most families, ENN camp is the “once a year respite” break to recharge and be able to do typical family outings while their child with special needs reaps the benefit of attending camp in an environment with his / her peers. ENN has been providing camps since 2002 and has served over 1,000 campers providing one counselor for every camper.

Camp is held at Camp Arroyo, a 138-acre parkland outside Livermore. Camp Arroyo was created by The Taylor Family Foundation, the East Bay Regional Park District, and the YMCA of the East Bay. The site is in the hills above Livermore wine country and is equipped with cabins, a dining facility, and activity center.

The Little League Challenger Program is Little League's adaptive baseball program for individuals with physical and intellectual challenges.

Any individual with a physical or intellectual challenge may participate. The Little League Challenger Division accommodates players ages 4-18, or up to age 22 if still enrolled in school. The Senior League Challenger Division accommodates players ages 15 and above (no maximum age).

Flexibility and adaptability are key during Challenger games. Little League provides all chartered teams with a rulebook that includes a best practices guide to operating a Challenger Game. Typically games are 1-2 innings long and last about an hour. All players play defensively and bat every inning.

Often buddies who are peer athletes participating in the Little League Baseball or Softball program assist Challenger athletes in the areas of batting, base running and defense, but only as needed.



The Pleasanton PTA Council Special Needs Committee (SNC) is made up of dedicated parent volunteers committed to making a difference in the lives of our special needs students and their families. Committee members include PUSD administrators from Special Education and PBIS as well as Parent Liaison. Our goal is to foster and maintain positive relationships between parents and PUSD, and spread awareness as well as acceptance of ALL abilities within our community. SNC sponsors free evening speaker events with well-known local authorities on topics such as learning and behavioral challenges, anxiety in children and teens, ADHD, understanding the Individual Education Plan (IEP) and 504 processes, and building blocks to a successful collaboration between parents and schools. We also sponsor the Ability Awareness Week program with participating schools throughout the district. Students learn about the challenges a child with special needs faces on a daily basis, and learn how to ACCEPT–UNDERSTAND–SUPPORT everyone and their differences. SNC defines “special needs” as a term that applies to children who are gifted learners, any child with a learning or processing difference, physical disability, cognitive delay, speech & language delay, behavioral challenges, social or emotional difficulty, and those with food allergies.

Quest Therapeutic Camps

Quest's Afterschool Program consists of three 10-week sessions each school year. Children and adolescents attend the afterschool program once a week for two hours (**from 4:00-6:00 p.m.**) and are grouped based on age and ability

Quest's intensive summer program runs from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM daily for six-seven weeks, five days per week. Each child participates in a small group of 12-18 campers and is guided by two or three of our excellent Quest counselors.


All campers must attend a minimum of three weeks in a row but many stay for the entire summer.

Effective Small Group Therapy: In addition to the structured behavioral milieu and typical camp activities, Quest campers receive group therapy with a professional therapist or psychologist at least four times a week. During these sessions, Quest professional staff develop and evaluate campers' [individualized treatment plans](#), use methods to confront interpersonal issues as they arise, and address campers' emotional and social reasoning skills. Quest therapeutic strategies have been uniquely developed to address the social, emotional, and cognitive skills that Quest campers need to be successful in their homes, at school, and among their peers.
